WHY I AM HERE - NATIONAL

- 18.6% of labor force are immigrants
- 20% of US workforce is Hispanic
- 1 in 4 construction industry workers are foreign-born
- 50% of construction laborers are Hispanic



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WHY I AM HERE - WISCONSIN



- Employer-reported injuries and illnesses higher than national average
- Immigrants provide ~80% of dairy labor on large operations
- Foreign-born residents 5.2% of population, up from 2.5% in 1990
- Immigrants make up 6.9% of labor force
- 81.6% immigrants working age vs. 61.4% US-born
- 40% WI immigrants from Latin America, 34% from Asia

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THE LANGUAGE GAP IMPACTS...

- DISADVANTAGED LEP WORKERS
- Higher risk of mental and physical harm
- 40-80% higher fatality risk, 30% higher injury risk
- LANGUAGE AND CULTURE
 - Isolation, information inequity
- STIGMA AND EXPECTATION
 - $\hbox{-} Social, political, religious, legal complications}\\$
- ACCESS TO TREATMENT
- Hispanic adults are 60% less likely to obtain mental health treatment

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SAFETY

Don't just tell people you care, show them

THE LANGUAGE GAP IMPACTS...

- CRITICAL COMMUNICATION
 - 127% less likely to report workplace hazards
- BOTTOM LINE
- Incident-related costs
- BILINGUAL EMPLOYEES
- Don't rely on your bilingual champion fully
- THE SAFETY MOVEMENT
 - Overall deaths are down, Hispanic deaths rose 42% from 2011 2021

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THE LANGUAGE GAP IMPACTS...

- EFFICACY AND EFFICIENCY
- 90% increase material engagement
- Overall injury decrease
- PRODUCTIVITY AND COMMUNICATION
 - $\hbox{-} \ {\sf Reduce} \ {\sf delays}, {\sf miscommunication}, {\sf retraining}, {\sf friction}$
- LITERACY AND OTHER LIMITATIONS
 - 50% report insufficient training language
 - 21% of US adults have low literacy
- COMPLIANCE
 - OSHA policy on language

"...if an employee does not speak or comprehend English, instruction must be provided in a language the employee can understand. ... if the employee's vocabulary is limited, the training must account for that limitation. ...if employees are not literate, telling them to read training materials will not satisfy the employer's training obligation."

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THE BUSINESS CASE FOR LANGUAGE ACCESS

1. LABOR SHORTAGE

- Construction industry needs est. 450,000 new workers + normal hiring to meet industry demand
- Staffing experts report massive waste of migrant talent due to non-inclusive practices



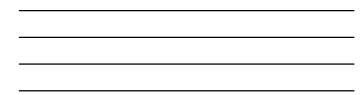
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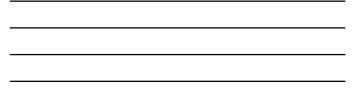
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THE BUSINESS CASE FOR **LANGUAGE ACCESS**

2. EMPLOYEE RETENTION AND SATISFACTION

- Power imbalance can lead to abuse of immigrant workers
- Replacing a frontline manufacturing employee costs average \$10,000-\$40,000
- Your reputation with future hires, competition, regulatory bodies, and customer base matter



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THE BUSINESS CASE FOR **LANGUAGE ACCESS**

3. PRODUCTIVITY AND SAFETY

- Multilingual resources increase training efficacy and efficiency
- A feeling of inclusion increases our loyalty and drive
- Following proper procedures reduces waste, delays, safety incidents, and compliance infractions

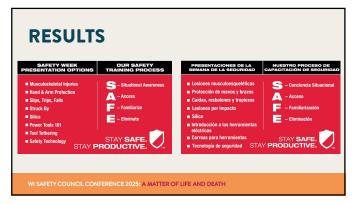
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STEPS TO TAKE

1. KNOW YOUR AUDIENCE

- Identify languages spoken, cultures
- Assess illiteracy concerns, compliance requirements
- Imagine a top-to-bottom language access strategy (dedicated budget, positions, etc.)



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STEPS TO TAKE

2. IDENTIFY PRIORITY MATERIALS

- Employee rights and responsibilities, Toolbox talks, training, signage
- Virtual content (educational videos and recorded meetings)
- Make cultural adaptations to text when necessary

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STEPS TO TAKE

3. FIND THE RIGHT PROVIDER

- Review different types of language services
- Consider freelancers, LSP, in-house linguistic team
- Find a provider with subject matter expertise
- Gather detailed internal feedback



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- Leave room for 20% text expansion into Spanish
- Include images whenever possible
- Avoid embedded text within images for easier formatting
- Reinforce written materials verbally
- Consider voice over for videos
- Provide resources alongside employee rights

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TACTICAL TAKEAWAYS

- Speak to collectivist ideology, not individualist
- Incentivize safe working practices
- Encourage supervisors, superintendents, foremen, etc. to learn basic Spanish or other languages
- Aim mentorship and leadership training toward LEP workers
- Promote natural leaders/bilingual champions
